Homelessness is not a crime and is not a Law Enforcement Issue

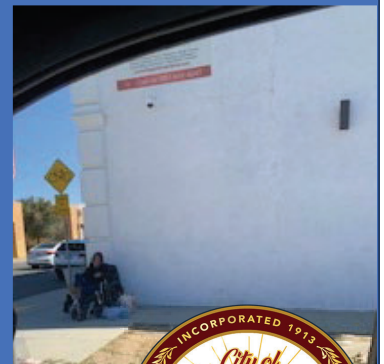
Why is Law Enforcement involved if Homelessness is not a crime?

- Lack of care





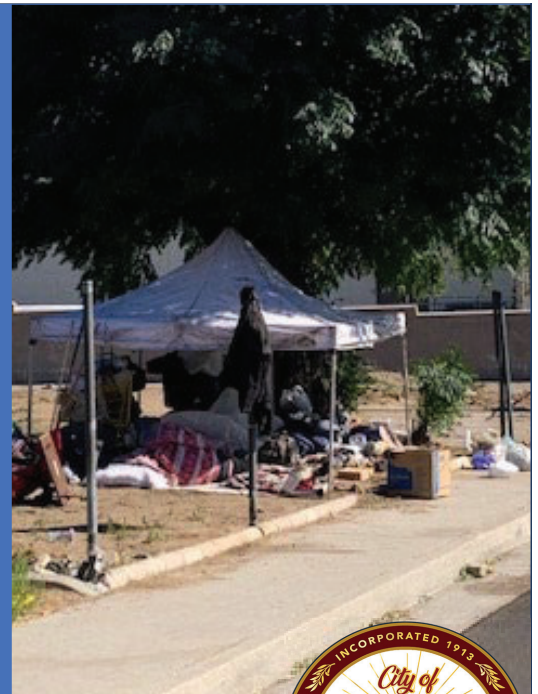

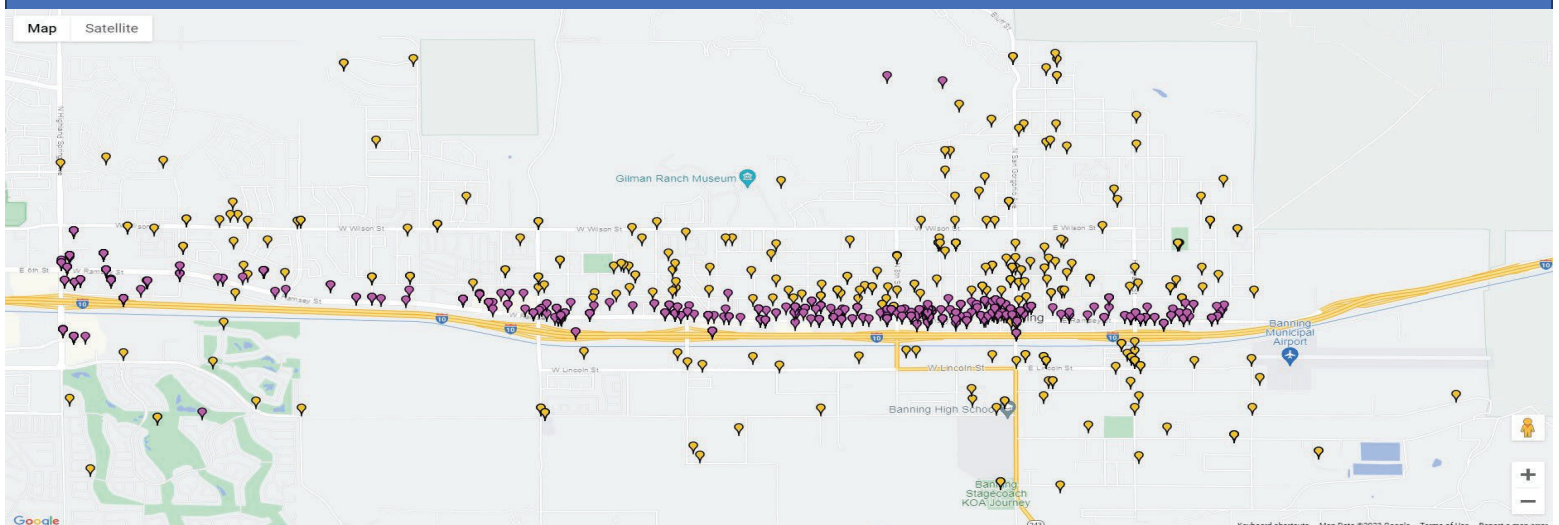

Riverside County Sheriff's Department efforts

- RSO does not release other cities arrestees in Banning and does not relocate transients into our City nor would he allow others to do so.
- No inmate leaves the jail without a ride, no one walks away from jail when released and into the neighborhood.
- If the transient was booked in by an outside agency, they are transported back with a bus pass or taxi voucher depending on time of day.
- The Sheriff's Department only drops off to a location where there is a driveway.
- Once given a taxi or bus pass, RSO cannot force them to use them.
- The only inmates released in the Banning Civic Center or Sun lakes bus stop have an address in the pass or they specifically requested to be dropped off at that location.

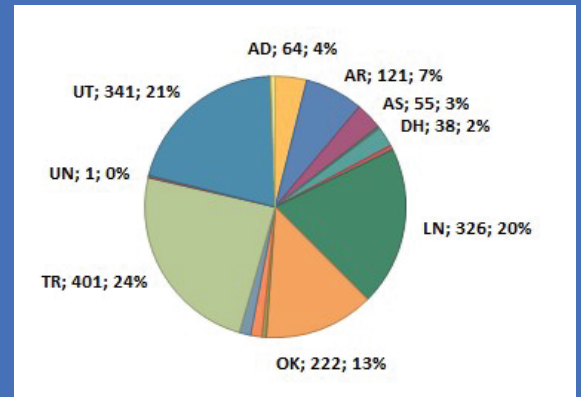

Community Behavioral Health Assessment Team

- Community Behavioral Assessment Team provides the following
 - Crisis stabilization, safety planning, assessment for danger to self/ others, and gravely disabled. Assessment for 5150 application holds as needed and provide follow up support (linkage to mental health clinics)
 - Provide referrals for additional mental health services including substance abuse treatment programs and housing (Riverside County)
 - Provide transportation and resources to voluntary emergency psychiatric services, Tele-care (Palm Springs, Riverside and Perris)
 - Referrals to family advocates

What kind of resources are used from the Police Department?



From October of 2022 to October of 2023

- 1569 calls for service related to Transient Disturbance

During each call for service there is a protocol, where the subject is contacted, identified and an investigation is conducted.

- Average time per contact is 28:44.
- If the call results in a booking or transport to a facility, that call can be greatly increased and can result in a 90:00 minute plus contact.

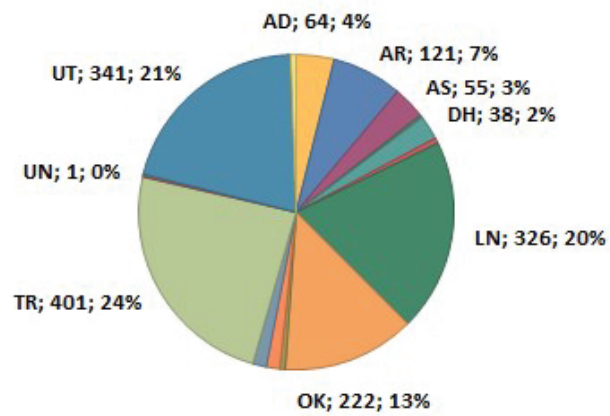


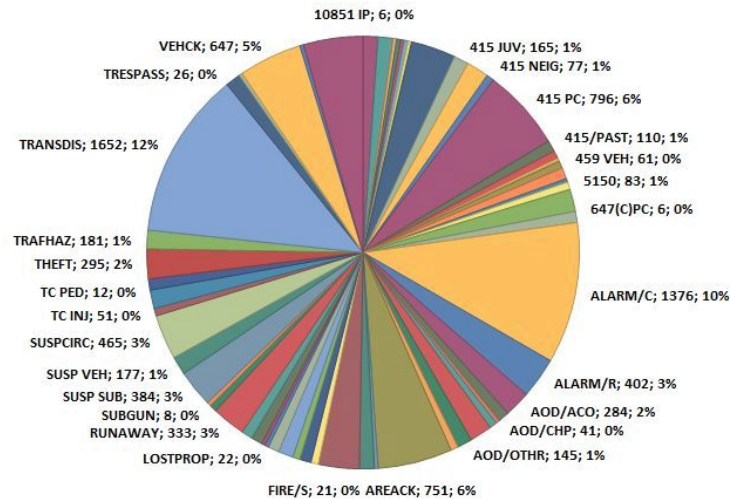


Dispositions

Future efforts

- The retired Banning Police Department Radio system will be reallocated and installed at Banning City Hall allowing direct and immediate communications between city departments, allowing for immediate response to pressing incidents.
- Ordinances/ Municipal Codes that support the efforts of the City Managers Office to combat the crimes that accompany homelessness.
- Work with our partners to come up with sensible solutions for donating items and food.
- Bolster the City Manager's volunteer program
- Bolster Banning Police Department's Volunteer program
- As Officer staffing rises, create a P.O.P. team (Problem Oriented Policing Team) or (I.R.T.) Immediate Response Team that can take direct, immediate action upon identified issues.
- Work with our partners to find new and innovative solutions to the problems associated with homelessness.
